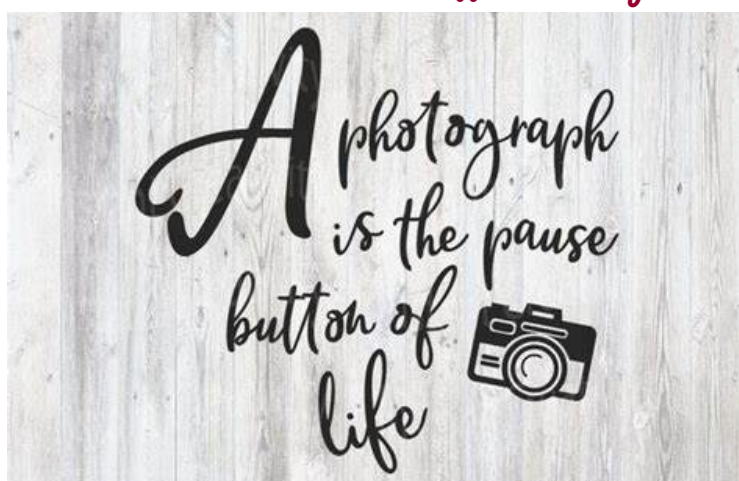

Hands On Science Workshops!

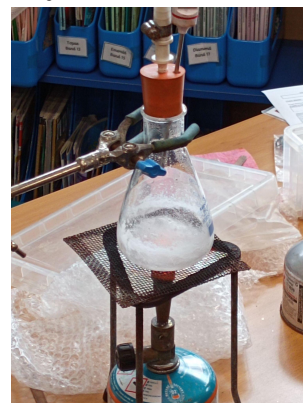
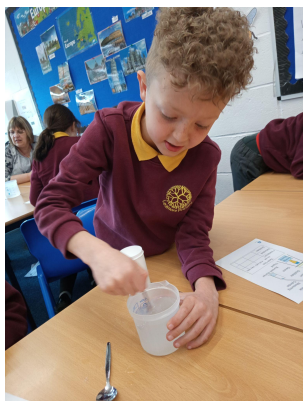
The children in Y1 were lucky enough to take part in a Biodiversity Workshop. The children learnt all about a range of different animals, including Cheetahs and Leopards.

The children learnt of the threats Cheetahs are currently facing, the pressures on many of our habitats and the importance of maintaining diversity in the health of individual species as well as our planet.

All of the children were even lucky enough to be provided with their very own cat/dog paw print that they were able to take home with them. As a class, we were also given a real Cheetah's paw print, which had been taken from a Cheetah currently living in Longleat!



When hands on science worked with year 4, they got to explore elements of the water cycle. They used a vast range of new vocabulary and got to observe what happens when salt is dissolved in water. Additionally, they got to use a range of scientific equipment such as a Bunsen burner and a pipette to separate salt from the water. From this we were able to visualise the journey water would go on in the water cycle.



In Year 3, our task was to build and land our “spacecraft” safely, without breaking our precious cargo...an egg!

We learnt about how scientific discoveries and inventions about the safety of materials, combined with principles of physics, have saved many lives. For example, Scientists have have worked out how to slow things down safely.

Y3 had a budget and brought materials from the “shop” such as bin liners, paper straws and foil. We then had to build the safest spacecraft that would protect our egg when being dropped from a height.



Young people warned to stay away from derelict buildings

West Midlands Police are urging parents to speak to their children about the dangers of entering derelict buildings in Walsall.

The police have received reports of anti-social behaviour and criminal activity taking place at derelict buildings. This has prompted the authorities to issue a warning to young people about the risks of entering these dangerous buildings and the consequences that can follow.

Derelict buildings are often structurally unsound and can pose a serious risk to anyone who enters them. The buildings may have weakened floors, walls or ceilings that could collapse at any moment, causing serious injury or even death.

The consequences of entering derelict buildings can be severe. In addition to the risks of injury or criminal activity, young people who are caught trespassing may face legal consequences. They may be fined, given a criminal record or even sent to prison.

Derelict buildings are often used by criminals for illegal activities such as drug dealing, theft or vandalism. Young people who enter these buildings may be putting themselves at risk of becoming victims of crime or even getting involved in criminal activity themselves.

Officers are patrolling known hotspot areas and taking action when reports of young people in derelict buildings are made. Local residents are advised to be vigilant and report any concerns or signs of entry to the police.
